Bill's Larva Lace Damsel Nymph

"June and July bring on the damselfly hatches. The nymphs migrate in great numbers to nearby reeds and lilypads where they crawl out of the water and hatch. The larva lace damsel is a good imitation of this nymph and can be deadly during the migration. Keep a few on hand for the first really hot spell of the spring."

MATERIALS

Hook: Mustad 9671 #12 **Thread**: Olive monocord **Tail**: Pheasant tail fibres

Abdomen: Olive larva lace (small)

Rib: None

Thorax: Olive Chenille Shellback: None Beard: None

Swimmerets: Pheasant tail fibres

TYING STEPS

- 1. Wrap on tying thread and tie in the tail of 4-5 strands of pheasant tail, about shank length long.
- 2. Secure the larva lace to the butt and wrap to a point mid-way between the hook point and the eye of the hook. Tie off and cut.
- 3. Tie in the olive chenille and wrap the chenille to just behind the eye. Tie off and cut leaving enough room to tie in the swimmerets and whip finish.
- 4. Tie in 4 strands of pheasant tail at the head so that they trail back along the left side of the fly, about shank length. Repeat for the right side.]
- 5.. Tie off and whip finish the head.
