







Have a great summer; see you at the fishouts and the other activities.



# Guest Speaker: Andy Sneddon Control Depth Fishing

The Island Waters Fly Fishers really got their money's worth from Andy Sneddon at our May meeting (we bought his dinner - thanks again Andy). He gave us more than depth control fishing, but the highlights of that topic are: -80-90% of a trout's menu comes from the bottom.

- -You need to determine the depth of the fish then present the fly at that depth.
- You need to present the fly at that depth for as long as possible.
- -Your fly is not at the depth you think it is for as long as you think it is.

# Methods to weight your flies:

- -Lead or equivalent wire under the fly's dressing.
- -Copper or other wire over the dressing.
- -Use of coneheads, bead heads etc. made of tungsten, copper, brass, lead, glass etc.
- -Fly design and materials e.g. marabou holds air.
- -Slim or sparse flies create less drag and sink faster.
- -Use heavier hook

Methods of weighting the leader:

- -Use split shot on the leader.
- -Use weighted putty (lead based).
- -Fluorocarbon is less visible and sinks faster than monofilament.
- -Use 3 ft. or less of tippet to prevent the fly from drifting up.
- -Tapered leaders are great to allow the fly to roll over but are not needed for nymphing.

### **Andy Sneddon's Presentation continued**

Andy's comments on fly lines are:

- -Good full sink lines are thin and heavy for faster sink rates.
- -You need to feel the fly touch bottom or come up with weeds occasionally to know that it is on bottom.
- -A type 3 full sink line will probably pull the fly down to 15 ft. while slowly kicking in a float tube.
- -Practice using brightly coloured flies to observe their depth and behaviour in streams.

Andy uses a very basic method to form loops on his fly lines:

- -Cut the end off with a tapered finish.
- -Loop it back with about a one inch loop and temporarily hold it in place with crazy glue.
- -Tie the tapered end back onto the fly line with 10/0 thread and whip finish it.
- -Coat the thread with Aquaseal or equivalent.

As a bonus, Andy even gave us a few tips on presenting the fly and mending the line:

- -Basically, mending the line is used to maintain the fly in a natural drift and is used to prevent the line from pulling the fly too fast or dragging it too slow.
- -Use a tuck cast or a curve cast to place the fly. -In some situations cast upstream to get the fly to drift into the desired position.
- -Develop a strategy at a stream prior to casting. Read the water's direction and speed, determine where the fish are or could be then figure out how and where the fly will be delivered.



# **Andy Sneddon's New Product**



Tuffleye is the brand name of the products used to replace epoxies.

There are two types of acrylite resins that come with the kit. One is "Core" used for the main body of the fly and the other is "Finish" used for light coatings. Both are applied and stay liquid until they are set by the blue light from the LED light emitter (looks like a flash light). The setting time is 10 to 20 seconds and is very tough.




The above are the advantages of Tuffleye over epoxies. The basic and complete kit can be purchased on line from www.wetahook.net/ and is listed for \$89.00 US. Andy said that he will be setting up the manufacturing plant for this product and Peter Morrison (our previous speaker) will be distributing it in Canada. A few members have purchased this kit - please tell us about it.





Saturday the morning meeting started at 9:00 am and was sparsely attended. The usual business was attended to and dispensed with promptly. There were no pressing environmental issues to contend with at this time but there are issues looming such as small hydro electric permits being applied for which will be installed in small streams and rivers without much regard for the fish habitat.

The usual reports were given and the federation appears to be in good hands. The committee reports show the area and special project representatives had a busy and fruitful year. The election of officers for the upcoming year was held and I will continue in my role as treasurer.

The president of the BCFFF, Gill Sage could not finish his term and the first VP. Pat Micek was elected to the president's position. This is a good move as the fly fishing community as a whole will benefit from his leadership.
